## From Rev'd Ann:

I don't know about you, but things seem rather wobbly to me these days, and I can find myself falling into despair about the state of the

world. When this happens I find parts of my Christian faith can really help.

In Matthew Chapter 24, after his disciples have admired the temple in Jerusalem, Jesus predicts its destruction and goes on to say, "and vou will hear of wars and rumours of wars: see

that you are not alarmed, for this must take place, but the end is not yet. For nation will rise against nation and kingdom against kingdom, and there will be famines and earthquakes in various places: all this is but the beginning of the birth pangs."

Jesus is right, these things will happen, and we have to admit our powerlessness in the face of them, which is terrifying. However, as a people with a sacred text we know that we are a very small part of a very big story and having that story should give us an important perspective.

the personal and political that is happening right now, it is good to remember that we are people of an old, old story, that starts at the beginning of time, brushes with the present and reaches into a promised future. More importantly, the promise that God is not yet done and that we are not alone still holds true. This is not a naïve or escapist hope, but the hope of people who have heard a rumour that



there is life after death and hope beyond suffering.

This is the strange thing that people of faith do. We do not invest our trust in financial markets, but in the God of Abraham and Sarah. We do not place our hope in the

government but in the God of Isaiah and Mary Magdalene. Our hope is not in our own ability to be hopeful or to get anything right whatsoever. Our hope is in the God of Jonah and Hagar.

If we are anxious today (and maybe we When all we can see and feel and think about is should be), we need to hear that we stand in a big story that has yet to end. We cannot know the end, but when the present threatens to consume us, we can be assured that God's story – our story – is still being written and will continue to be written long after we have left this material world. So, despite our anxieties, as people of faith, we still dare to get our hopes up. Go well, Ann
