From Rev'd Ann:

Have you ever been told, or passed on the comment, "don't get your hopes up".

When this is said, it can often mean, 'don't expect anything or you'll be disappointed'.

But hope is different from expectation. Our expectations are what often keep us from being open to the present. Worse still, expectations are sometimes just the other side of entitlement; there is very little joy in getting what we believe we have coming to us anyhow.

That's why I think it's important to see how expectations and entitlement differ. Expectancy is what the prophet Jeremiah had when he said 'The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will fulfil the promise I made to the house of Israel and the house of Judah.' (Jeremiah 31:31). Jeremiah is sitting in prison as Jerusalem is being taken over by Nebuchadnezzar and everything is collapsing around him, yet he holds fast to the promises of God. So what does he do?

Despite the chaos and despair around him, in a defiant act of hope, Jeremiah buys land. He refused to let the threatening clouds rolling over the present darken his view of what is possible in the future. His confidence was in God—He is true to his word. Our hope is not in humanity but in renew all things. As people of God hand reaching ba

It reminds me of Martin Luther's famous response when he was asked what he would do if he knew the world would end tomorrow. He said "I'd plant a tree".

Our hope in God is neither naïve nor escapist.



Quite the opposite. It's the hope of people who have heard the dangerous rumour that there is life beyond death and hope beyond suffering and that love eventually conquers the soul-crushing stuff we humans keep perpetuating.

It's seems a completely bonkers thing we do as Christians. We stand in the middle of a troubled world and raise our heads in expectancy of good things. That's because our hope is not in ourselves nor in humanity but in God who has promised to renew all things.

As people of God's story, we can have one hand reaching back to touch the hope of the prophets and one hand reaching out to the promised redemption of the world. So we live in the moment, vulnerable but not crushed. Our confidence is in God.

So, buy land and plant trees, and pray "Your will be done on earth...." Ann.
