Dear Friends,

As I write, the rather gloomy January afternoon outside contrasts, in my mind's eye, with the destination in Central America to which D and I will travel this spring.

Certainly, the week or so we plan to spend in the bright air of the sub-tropical Spring in Belize, with its off-shore coral reefs, timber-rich rain forests and pine-clad inland hills, is a delightful prospect at this point of the year. But for us, this will be not so much a holiday as a journey of re-discovery.

Thirty-five years ago, as a very young family, my wife D, our children and I spent a little less than two years in Belize. Our circumstances there exposed us to all sorts of new influences, friendships and spiritual encounters. For us, all these were the starting point of a slow journey of faith and experience that eventually led me to ordination, six years ago, and us to where we are now.

This Spring, we look forward to meeting old (some very old) friends and revisiting an environment and a culture which was formative for us in all sorts of ways. Of course, Belize now is very different to how it was in 1975. But so are we. That is the excitement of our returning now.

Doesn't life sometimes feel like a game of "consequences"?

Of course, everyone has their own story to tell about the circumstances life immersed them in and how they responded. But it is always interesting, particularly in retrospect, to ask what part our "faith" (or dare we even say "God") played in shaping the consequences, either in us or in others?

Some of us may feel our story is un-dramatic or even mundane, but something about it may make it quite remarkable to others. But, dramatic or not, it can still be interesting for us to think back, to revisit in order to rediscover what was really happening. Was there a moment when we actually allowed God's unseen presence or power to become part of our response to events? And when we did, what happened next?

During this years' Lent course, we hope to share experiences of such journeys and of the part faith has played in them. Rediscovering our own journey will be good preparation for that. I hope we will all find encouragement in the stories people tell of the journeys that they have made and are making.

Not surprisingly, the course will be called "Faith Journeys", and we can look forward to reading more details in next months' Magazine (Lent doesn't start until 9 March this year).

We can also look forward to seeing the signs of Spring when they appear, whether we see them here in beautiful Suffolk, or in some more exotic place to which God might take us.

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Until then, I hope you can keep warm and dry; and may God's blessing go with you.

SEASIDE REMEMBRANCE SERVICE AND WALK FOR ST ELIZABETH HOSPICE

An outdoors remembrance service on a Suffolk beach will be held as part of St Elizabeth Hospice's popular Walk of Thoughts this year.

The fundraising walk will take place on Sunday 6th March 2011 following a 5.5 mile circular route through Dunwich Heath National Trust countryside.

This will be the fifth annual Walk of Thoughts and the sponsored event is set to attract around 150 keen walkers and those who want to remember a loved one. The event is set to raise around £10,000 to help provide St Elizabeth Hospice services free of charge to people with a progressive illness throughout East Suffolk.

For the first time the walk will be preceded by an outdoor remembrance service on the beach at Dunwich at 11am. The service will be led by Hospice chaplain the Revd Jane Kingsnorth and provide an opportunity for reflection for all the walkers, not just those who have been touched by Hospice care.

St Elizabeth Hospice, based in Ipswich, is an independent charity which costs £6.6m a year to run and relies largely on donations and fundraising events. The walk is open to people of all ages. It will start from Dunwich Beach Car Park and take approximately 2.5 hours. Walkers can register in advance or on the day at 10.30am.

BRANDESTON-SUPPORTING THE CHILDREN OF NANSAMBO IN MALAWI by Sue Tobin

Nansambo School, in the rural area of Chingale, Southern Malawi, is a school with over 1,300 pupils between the ages of 6 and 15. These children live in fourteen villages in the school catchment area and walk up to 3 km to school each day. More than a quarter of them are orphans who live with extended families.

When we started "The Nansambo School Fund", there were 5 teachers, the classrooms had had almost no maintenance for many years and were very dilapidated, and the pupils had insufficient materials for effective learning.

The Fund set about meeting the shortfall in government provision for basic educational items – for example exercise books, biros, pencils, rules and even chalk for the teachers! Gradually, as the Fund has grown with support from individuals and one or two churches, it has been able to fund training for four Teaching Assistants at the school, which immediately reduced class sizes to 100, and to consider other projects.

In 2010, as well as the Teaching Assistants at the school, we have provided a variety of sports equipment to both the primary and secondary schools at Nansambo. In May 2010,



we were able to fund two new toilet blocks at the primary school – each of 6 toilets – as well as a new secure storeroom at the school. A contribution from Brandeston helped to make this possible.

For the future, we have a defined annual maintenance programme which includes, among other things, the annual inspection and maintenance of the new borehole we had funded. We understand that replacement filters may be required, work which will be undertaken professionally by The Freshwater Project of Malawi, whose staff will have to travel from Blantyre.

The support we have received from Churches like Brandeston has enabled us to introduce a new Sponsorship scheme in October 2010. This will make it possible for an extra 4 children a year to continue in education beyond Primary School. Throughout Malawi, only 11% of eligible children embark on Secondary Education. Cost is the chief reason for this, since all secondary education costs have to be personally funded. The children we sponsor each year, will be provided with locally made uniforms [including shoes which, though optional at primary, are compulsory at secondary school], satchel or rucksack, exercise and study books, pens, pencils, erasers and rules, and their termly school fees will be paid.

In sponsoring their secondary education, we ask of the students to maintain an 80% attendance record [this allows for one bout of malaria or a family crisis each term], to be of good behaviour, show commitment to study and provide evidence of progress in their termly report from the secondary school.

As well as improving conditions and enhancing the education of children who would otherwise be unable to, we believe that what we are doing will unlock further opportunities for training and education, leading to better jobs, all of which will enable them to build a better life for themselves and contribute to their nation's progress and development.

It is only with such support that a better future can be more than just a dream for children in Nansambo. Among Malawi's problems is poverty to a degree that is almost incomprehensible to us in England. Malawi is a country of immense potential if only its most precious asset - its amazing people – can be given a decent start in life through education.

My son and daughter and I have asked ourselves, do we do nothing because we cannot help everyone, or do we do what we can to help a few? With the help of people such as yourselves in Brandeston and Kettleburgh we have chosen the latter option and we believe that, together, we are making a real difference to the futures of these children living some 6000 miles away in Malawi.

TIMES PAST

Kettleburgh residents will probably be familiar with the fact that on the south side of St Andrew's nave, the bottom step of the rood loft stairs, is the lid of an ancient coffin. However finding such an architectural feature is more interesting if a description of its discovery can be read. Here is the account reported in the publication of the Suffolk Institute of Archaeology of 1948.

Stone Coffin at Kettleburgh

On the 29th of November 1948, the Rev. Mr Samuel Wynn Davies incumbent of Brandeston and Kettleburgh, reported the discovery of a stone coffin in St Andrew's Church.

Work was going on in the church including the removal of a matchboard dado in the nave. This exposed the sides of a stone coffin which is built into the south nave wall, near the chancel arch at a height of about 2 feet from the floor to the top of the coffin lid. The head of the coffin is towards the west. The coffin is shaped for the shoulders and appears to be of a late type, the ends are flush with the wall, and the shoulder part slightly protruding.

This revealed the skeleton of a male, judged by a medical practitioner to be that of a man who was between twenty and thirty years of age when he died. He would have been five feet 8½ inches in height.

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The opening was then sealed up.

A further discovery will be featured next month.
