Dear Friends

Our annual Remembrance commemoration, each November, reminds us of the human cost of war. This month, we will hear again the names of the men of our villages whose commitment to the cause of freedom from fear, and whose acceptance of the discipline of service led them into danger and to death.

Those of us who live peacefully in Suffolk today and look forward to living here tomorrow in relative comfort and peace, should feel challenged by the commitment of those who gave and continue to give their lives in this way. Our annual Remembrance commemoration reminds us never take the ease of our lives for granted, but to continue to honour the cost paid in lives, on our behalf.

The word "commitment" was used last month in news reports from Iran of the plight of Pastor Youcef Nadarkhani, who is under sentence of death for apostasy in a country where the constitution secures for its citizens the freedom to freedom to worship, and yet where the system of justice has condemned him.

Pastor Joucef's commitment to the Christian faith is courageous, joyful and challenging. Courageous because he seems unmoved by the pressure he is under to renounce his faith; joyful because his faith is based on truth, simplicity and love; and challenging because not only does it challenge the Iranian authorities, but it also challenges Christians throughout the world to consider our support for him and our own commitment to our faith.

The Christian faith leads us to honour the commitment of those who are prepared to pay with their lives the cost of love, of faithfulness under persecution and of self-sacrifice for the highest principles of freedom and concern for the lives of others, because it is founded upon our understanding that God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, Jesus Christ and that example of giving transforms our understanding of death, and gives us hope for life.

SHOEBOXES FOR ROMANIA APPEAL 2011

Thank you to those who took part in this year's Family Shoebox Appeal. It is amazing what a simple gift-filled shoebox can do for a family in need. You can read from the quote below from a recipient how important toiletries are to include in the Shoebox:

"We went into one house with several children and a mother struggling to cope. We gave them a shoebox and they opened it immediately. Imagine our confusion when the mum started to cry at the contents. We hurriedly asked the translator what we had done wrong, worrying that we had made some cultural mistake. The real reason became evident when the mother hugged the bottle of shampoo that was inside the shoebox. She simply said, " Now we can be clean".

Link Romania also wants to let people know that shoeboxes are given out only to people in poverty and regardless of people's colour, creed or religion:

"We went to visit a school to give our Shoeboxes and were surprised when the head teacher kept whispering to us when we entered particular classrooms. After a while we worked out that children from the Roma communities (gypsies) were segregated and kept away from the other children by putting them in separate classrooms. We pointedly made sure that we entered every single classroom and made sure all the children were given a shoebox regardless of race, colour or creed. Shoeboxes are for everyone and we make sure that no-one is excluded" JC

THANKS TO BRANDESTON

Our youngest daughter Harriet is at present working as a palliative care nurse for the Mercy Ship in Freetown, Sierra Leone. I was very privileged to be allowed to go out and stay on the ship for 12 days, and then go out into Freetown with Harriet to see her work and visit her patients. As a result of this I came home with the awareness of much need in the homes I visited.

The Brandeston PCC decided that the collection from our Harvest Evensong on Sunday Sept 25^{th} would go directly to Harriet for her to contribute to the daily needs of one particular family. The wonderful sum of £257.15 was most generously given, and when I spoke to Harriet she was thrilled with the amount.

She asked me to thank everyone who was at the service so very much for their kindness, and on her return to England in December will update everyone with what their money has been spent on, and with a photo of the family.

ADVENT

TIMES PAST

This November we come to the last of the men from our two parishes who fell in the Great War of 1914-1918. Fittingly it is Charles Emeny who holds this position because although his name is inscribed on Brandeston's memorial, he also lived for a time in Kettleburgh. Charles Emeny was the only son of John and Emma Emeny (née Bridges). The Emeny family originated in Peasenhall but Charles' great grandfather settled in Brandeston about 1814 where he and his descendents carried on the trade of bricklaying.

Charles was born at 33, The Street, Brandeston on May 1st 1890 and baptised at All Saints'. Afterwards he attended the village school in Mill Lane before becoming a bricklayer.

Charles met and married Edith Catherine Smith from Ipswich who taught at Kettleburgh School. The couple lived at Brook Cottage, Kettleburgh where in January and December 1914 their two sons, John and Charles Junior were born.

On January 30th 1915 at Framlingham, Charles enlisted as a Private in the 10th Battalion of the Suffolk Regiment, Number 18567. He acted as a stretcher bearer as he did not wish to kill anyone.

In 1917 Charles was wounded, being sent to the Dick red Cross Hospital in Kilmarnock, Scotland to recover. The family moved to 17, Low Street, Brandeston. Charles returned to the front whilst Edith started teaching again at Brandeston School in September 1917 taking Charles Junior, now two and three quarters with her.

Her husband was killed in action in Northern France at Hazebrouch on August 8th 1918 at the age of twenty eight. He was shot in the head by a sniper whilst helping a wounded comrade in the trenches, and was buried at Merville Communal Cemetery Extension in France.

Charles Emeny's younger son continued to take an interest in happenings here; he gave a donation to help in the moving of Brandeston's War Memorial to the Churchyard in 1985 and a red rose bush similar to the one planted on his fathers' grave in Northern France. A total of twenty eight men from Brandeston and Kettleburgh lost their lives in the First World War.
