Dear Friends,

2012 is the 350th anniversary of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer.

In a foreword to a booklet to mark the anniversary, Prudence Dailey, the Chairman of the Prayer Book Society writes:

'Forty years ago it seemed that the Church of England's founding liturgy would be little more than an historical note by the time of its 350th anniversary. Church modernizers, swept along by the spirit of the age, saw the 1662 Book of Common Prayer as 'irrelevant' both in its language and in its emphasis on man's fallen nature and his need for grace; many believed that liturgical reform would be a cure for dwindling congregations.' She goes on to say that

'The Book of Common Prayer is an inspired collection of services for public worship and a complete guide- book for daily Christian living. It makes no apology for being challenging, because the journey of faith is challenging; much of its appeal is that it expresses eternal truths in numinous language. There is evidence that once young people become familiar with the pages of this treasure-house, they come to appreciate it as a source of stability in a fast-changing world'.

I say 'Amen' to that.

To celebrate an 8.00a.m. B.C.P.service of Holy Communion in a small country Church, to recite the Benedicite in Morning Prayer, or to take part in Prayer Book Evensong are part of the great privilege of being a parish priest. Numbers do not actually matter, the 'tyranny of relevance' can be left aside, and the language of the liturgy can act as a springboard into the numinous, the sense of the holy.

I write this letter on the eve of Lent, that season of the Church's year that carries with it a chance to listen more carefully to the cadences of the numinous, and so to prepare for the glory of Easter. Let the last word be with the Archbishop of Canterbury!:

'The words of the Book of Common Prayer have a rare capacity not only to sink into the memory through their rhythms but to calm the very pace of our thoughts. They are words that help us to be open and still, to recognize with sober humility the greatness of what confronts us in the mysteries of our redemption.'

Perhaps this Lent we may seek to rediscover the treasures of the Book of Common Prayer.

Ipswich Umbrella Trust work to give such people a drink, a meal, a shower, dry clothes and try to help them back into work or to access health or social care so that they can live independently.

As part of their work they hand out emergency food boxes...a small collection of tinned goods that can provide an instant meal. Their post-Christmas stocks are very low!!!!

TIMES PAST

Since last month it has been discovered that James Whatling, Brandeston's Overseer of the Poor, 1821-1822 was also the first landlord of the Queen's Head which opened in 1811. Before that time he had been a brick maker, probably at the brickworks which occupied land opposite the Manse. Obviously he was a pillar of the community.

Brandeston also possesses earlier records of its poor in a book which dates back from 1728-1757. This gives a lot of information about poor people living in the 'town' as it was called then. Included is work carried out at the 'Poor or Town House' in the village but it is not known where this was built. Any ideas would be welcome.

1734 350 white bricks for the Town House

1735 Robert Roddewell's Bill for work at the Town House in the Gravell Pit

Item 4 days of myself

Item 7 days of Simon Fox

Item 2 Bushel of Hair

Item 16 Bushel of lime

Item 750 Bricks from Hacheston Kiln

Item To Wid Taylor from carriage of them

Item To William King for digging and making of a load of clay

Item Paid him more for hanging of 2 loads of clay

Item Carriage of the Clay from Mr Sheppards of Hoo Hall

1740 Henry Chamberlin for a New Gate for the Town House

1742 Paid Robert Athow for thatching done upon the Town House

1747 Henry Chamberlin Stopping up Windows at the Town House

Note 1747. A new Window Tax provided that houses with 10-14 windows paid 6 pence per window in addition to a basic 2 shillings per household that had been paid previously. Brandeston wanted to economise on parish expenses!

Building of a lean to on North side of Workhouse with a House of Office together with the Bricklayer's Work, Dauber's work, Thatcher's work, etc.

How much better off we are now!
