The vast majority affected were over 65 years old. Sadly, this is just the tip of the iceberg over 56,095 households in Suffolk live in fuel poverty, suffering in silence during the coldest months, often hidden from view, withdrawn from the world around them.

With many older people having to make the stark choice between heating their homes or putting food on the table, The Suffolk Foundation is launching its second Surviving Winter Appeal to help reduce fuel poverty and isolation in Suffolk. SUFFOLK POLICE NOTICE

Police in Suffolk are urging residents to keep car keys out of view in their homes, following a spate of burglaries involving the theft of keys and subsequent theft of motor vehicles.

As part of Operation Drawbridge, Suffolk Police's campaign to reduce burglaries and bring offenders to justice, police are reminding all to take this simple step and stop giving burglars access to vehicles.

Supt Phil Aves said, "It is upsetting that we have seen a spate of this type of burglary this week. Not only are these offenders gaining access to people's homes and stealing their possessions, but also going one step further and taking keys so that they may steal vehicles. "If burglars have managed to get inside a home, it is essential that they are not offered 'easy pickings'. Valuable items, cash and jewellery should be kept out of view, and secured if possible, and keys should not be left in obvious places. Do not leave them near to windows and doors, as burglars will often target these directly, quickly gaining access and grabbing keys. Don't leave them in 'key holders' or similar with labels explaining what they are for, and avoid leaving them hanging in keyholes.

"We will do all we can to try and reduce the amount of burglaries happening across the county, and we will continue to help residents in making their homes more secure. On the unfortunate occasions where burglars do manage to access homes, we must ensure that we do not make their lives easy, by giving access to valuable possessions."

TIMES PAST

Recently it has been possible to examine a book 'Extenta Maner de Woodbredg Nuper Priorat 1560' which gives a list of the Rentals of the Manor of the Priory of St Mary, Woodbridge. The account makes mention both of Brandeston and Kettleburgh. A number of people are mentioned and their names link up with those who appear in the Wills which date back to 1453, made before the Church Registers began here in 1559.

One entry seems to tie in with the work currently being carried out on the river bridge in Mill Lane, Kettleburgh (See Brandeston and Kettleburgh Parish News, November 2012, pages 8 and 9).

'Lionel Wade holds one free tenement late Thomas Wade formerly John Hylte before William Hylte lying in Brandeston between the land of the said Lionel formerly Robert Cane on the south and the way that leads from Osmonds Brygge towards Debenham on the north whereof the east head abuts on a way bending to the said Osmond Brygge up towards Gippiswich (Ipswich) and the west head on land of the late Prior of St Peter of the town of Gippiswich in part and the land of the said Lionel formerly Robert Cane in part and pays at the feast of St Michael the Archangel and at Easter yearly iiii (4 shillings)'.

452 years ago and the same kind of strengthening work needing to be undertaken now. Do times change all that much? *WMW*
