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## NEWS FROM FRAMLINGHAM MEDICAL PRACTICE

It is with great sadness that we have to announce the death of Dr Darryl Peel.

Dr Peel was badly injured in a bonfire accident at his home on Wednesday 6 February. He was taken by Air Ambulance to the specialist burns unit at Broomfield Hospital in Chelmsford.

Despite the excellent care that he received, unfortunately Dr Peel was not able to recover from his extensive injuries and died on Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup> February. Dr Peel leaves a wife, Susie and three teenage children.

Dr Peel has been a popular GP at Framlingham surgery since September 2006. Many of his patients will remember him as being a big sports fan but of course his real passion was his

music. Pictures of his favourite bands adorned his consulting room walls and he was an enthusiastic supporter of live music.

Dr Peel will be missed greatly by both staff and patients at the surgery. We have been very grateful for the many messages of sympathy and support which we have passed on to Dr Peel's family.

Patients of Dr Peel will continue to be looked after by the other doctors at the practice.

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#### DISCOVER SUFFOLK IN 52 WAYS OVER 23 DAYS – THE SUFFOLK WALKING FESTIVAL 11 May – 2 June 2013

Ever wanted to weave your way through fields of flax, march through history, search for treasure or ramble through the countryside to the sound of poetry? Well now is your chance! With over 50 guided walks to choose from, The Suffolk Walking Festival is a cornucopia of delightfully themed walks that will take you through gently undulating countryside, around villages and towns awash with some fine architecture and along the wonderful landscape of the Suffolk Coast.

The festival kicks off with the 'Launch Jaunt' at Ickworth House near Bury St Edmunds on 11th May and runs for three weeks until 2nd June.

In the middle of the festival (18 - 22 May) is the Discover Suffolk Challenge Walk, which follows the coast path from Landguard Fort, up to Lowestoft and covers 66 miles in five days. We don't want anyone to feel obliged to do all five days, but there will be prizes and lots of praise for those hardy folk who do!

There is also a charity walk in aid of St Nicholas Hospice Care, which is 14 miles around the lovely landscape of the Lark Valley. Not all of the walks are this long - there is a good range for all abilities and some suitable for children too.

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# **IPSWICH UMBRELLA TRUST**

Where has the time gone? It was in March 2012 that the Churches of Brandeston and Kettleburgh initiated the project to collect food for the homeless of Ipswich. The response from both villages was overwhelming and we are planning to make a similar collection in May this year.

The Umbrella Trust has certainly widened its activities in the last year, and it has been interesting to look at the sort of projects they are involved in. They remain dedicated to providing a pathway from crisis and chaos to independence and stability, to create a community in which no-one is penniless, homeless, hungry, isolated or desperately trying to control addictive behaviour.

As you may remember they are based in Black Horse Lane, near the centre of Ipswich and there they provide <u>a Day Centre</u> where expert advice about benefits, accommodation and financial management is available. There is a cafe providing affordable (sometimes free) hot meals, a clothing bank for protection from cold and to encourage self-respect, **food parcels for the hungry and penniless**, showers for a shave and clean-up, laundry facilities and easy access to NHS Outreach .....health care three days a week.

The <u>First Floor Project</u> is a new project, planned to help sustain the recovery of those returning from rehab to control their misuse of substances and alcohol. Funding is in place to establish a programme of worthwhile activities home-making skills, art, drama, gardening and personal fitness tailored to the service users' needs and aspirations.

The Trust has also been involved in <u>'Assertive Outreach</u>', actively seeking those who may be wary of asking for help. Six months funding in 2012 enabled an Outreach Worker and team of volunteers to go on to the streets of Ipswich and make known the services offered by the Community Resource centre. Because of this Umbrella Trust pilot, good progress has been made in identifying and engaging with entrenched rough sleepers, helping them access services, helping them find accommodation, fostering relations with neighbouring authorities, and developing a protocol for returning UK nationals to their family or previous locality and for non-UK nationals sleeping rough, a return to their country of origin. The Umbrella Trust is a partner organisation with The Ipswich Homelessness Transition Project and together they make up the <u>Ipswich Locality Homelessness Partnership</u> which was successful in obtaining funding to help entrenched rough sleepers to move from street living to independence.

As you will see, a lot of work is being done and I have highlighted what we hope will be our contribution.....**food parcels for the hungry and penniless**. The requirements are a little different from last year but the method of collection the same.....door-to-door in Kettleburgh and collection at the Coffee Morning in Brandeston. Let's hope you will give as generously as last year!
