ST ELIZABETH HOSPICE CONNECTING CARE

October 4-11 marks Hospice Care Week, a national campaign to help raise awareness and celebrate the work of local hospices, like St Elizabeth Hospice, improving life for people living with a progressive illness.

The theme for this year's Hospice Care Week is 'Connecting Care' and throughout the week St Elizabeth Hospice will be telling people about the innovative ways in which they connect with local people, including through community engagement work. They will also highlight examples of their compassionate and personalised care, connecting with people wherever they are.

Mark Millar, St Elizabeth Hospice's acting chief executive, said: "Hospice Care Week is a big week for us as it gives us the perfect opportunity to really shout about the work we do and raise awareness of the breadth of services we offer, not only for patients, but for families, carers and health professionals too. We connect with a variety of people including those in schools, groups and businesses throughout the local community.

"A lot of people have misconceptions about what hospice care is and this national week allows us and other hospices across the country, to educate and inform people about what hospice care really is and dispel some of the common myths."

5 myths dispelled:

- 1. Hospices are not just a place people go to die. Patients can come to a hospice for outpatient appointments, day care, therapy, pain relief respite, as well as for end-of-life care
- 2. Hospice care is not just a building. Around 80 per cent of St Elizabeth Hospice's patients are cared for at home or in the community. The hospice centres its care around an individual's needs which means offering specialist support wherever it is required
- 3. Hospices don't just care for people with cancer. St Elizabeth Hospice improves life for people living with any progressive illness, such as motor neurone disease, multiple sclerosis, Parkinsons, heart, lung and kidney disease, as well as cancer
- 4. Anyone from the age of 14 upwards can be cared for by St Elizabeth Hospice the hospice is currently developing its young adult service, working with young patients aged 14-30 to improve their care to meet the needs of younger people
- 5. Hospices are not scary or sad places. They are a happy place filled with laughter where people are supported to live the rest of their lives as fully as possible

LINK ROMANIA SHOEBOX APPEAL 2015

Many people now contribute to this charity each year, and this is just a reminder about items for boxes this year, which need to be ready by the end of October. The following items are suitable for a Family Shoebox: shampoo, shower gel, small toys, toothbrushes and paste, nail clippers, brush/comb, safety razors, simple calculator, hair accessories, soap/flannel, colouring books, writing pads, sweets, chocolate, sewing kit, candles, soft toys, screwdriver, tape measure, socks, tights. If you would like to contribute a box for an elderly person/couple, extra ideas include: plasters, tissues, reading glasses, lavender bag, pens, paper, small mirror. There are now three ways that you can help - as well as two kinds of boxes, there is also a foreign currency collection. SUFFOLK NHS ADVICE Help prevent falls and trips

Don't underestimate the consequences of an older person having a fall. A fall can result in broken hips or bones and even early death. In addition to the pain and distress a fall can cause, it can take away someone's self-confidence, leaving them afraid to go out and socially isolated. The statistics on falls are staggering:

- 50% of people aged over 80 suffer a fall each year
- 33% of people aged over 65 suffer a fall each year
- 1 in 10 elderly falls result in serious injury
- 25% of all 999 calls are falls related

One way of reducing the chance of falling is by replacing old and worn slippers. Many people have a favourite pair of comfy slippers that could be potentially dangerous. Worn soles can easily lead to a slip and slippers that fit poorly can cause a trip.

The safest slippers are those with good quality non-slip rubber soles, are enclosed and have a fastener.

So, if you have a pair of old and worn slippers, please think about replacing them. And if you've got an elderly friend or relative think about giving them an early Christmas present of a new pair of slippers.

It's almost time for a flu vaccination

GPs are encouraging people in at-risk groups to start thinking about getting their winter flu jab.

From September GP practices will be contacting patients in at-risk groups, informing them of their entitlement to a free NHS flu vaccination. For your convenience many GP practices will be operating walk- in flu clinics.

At risk-groups entitled to a free NHS flu vaccination from their GP:

- You are aged 65 years or over.
- You are pregnant.
- You are living in a long-stay residential care home.
- You are the carer of an elderly or disabled person whose welfare may be at risk if you fall ill.
- You are a child aged 2, 3 or 4 years.
- You are aged six months to 65 years and have a heart problem; a chest complaint or breathing difficulties including bronchitis and emphysema; a kidney disease; lowered immunity due to disease or treatment (such as steroid medication or cancer treatment); a liver disease; had a stroke or TIA; diabetes; a neurological condition e.g. multiple sclerosis or cerebral palsy; a problem with, or removal of, their spleen e.g. sickle cell disease. If you are someone in an at risk group, or know someone who is, please don't underestimate how serious flu can be. A serious case of flu could result in bronchitis or pneumonia, a worsening of your diabetes and for pregnant women premature labour or even stillbirth.
