#### HISTORY CORNER

# Local Crime 1805 from the Ipswich Journal.

Escaped from justice Thomas Coates of Cretingham in this county; dark hair, ruddy complexion, wide mouth, roundish face, a little bandy legged, with his knees standing a little wide and the bone of his legs standing a little forward; about 20 years of age and 5 feet five or six inches high; had on a long dark coloured slop frock, rather dirty leather breeches and leather buskins. Whoever shall give information to John Edwards Bucke constable of Brandeston so that the said Thomas Coates can be apprehended, shall be well rewarded by the said John Edwards Bucke

And all constables in the county are requested in their respective parishes are requested to pay particular attention to any person of such description coming into the parish and immediately take him to a neighbouring magistrate to account for himself and all alehouse keepers are requested immediately upon such persons coming into an ale house to give information to the constable of his parish. Any constable or any person producing who will produce to the said John Edwards Bucke, the said Thomas Coates or cause him to be apprehended shall be paid all expences with a proper reward. Brandeston Hall. Dec 19<sup>th</sup> 1805. In these days before photography I loved the very careful description given, especially the details of his legs! So far, I haven't found what happened to Thomas but if caught he would probably have been transported. Feb 19<sup>th</sup> 1803. James Holmes, servant to Richard More of Bedingfield for misbehaviour in the Kings highway in the parish of Easton on Wednesday sennight<sup>(1)</sup> being in liquor and more than 100 yards behind his waggon drawn by

misbehaviour in the Kings highway in the parish of Easton on Wednesday sennight<sup>(1)</sup> being in liquor and more than 100 yards behind his waggon drawn by 5 horses. (poor chap, I can imagine him trying to catch the cart up, but never quite making it! P.D.) John Whistlecraft, servant to Nathan Welton of Bedfield for driving a wagon on the same day with 5 horses in it, in the parish of Easton sitting in the back of it without any reins in his hands; Robert Hawes servant to Sam Malster of Horham for a similar offence in Kettleburgh.

It is apparent that driving while over the limit was a common offence then and the Chequers was probably a popular stopping place with drivers!

(1) "sennight" a delightful word, now out of common use meaning "two weeks ago".
