DO YOU ENJOY SINGING? CAN YOU PLAY THE PIANO/ORGAN? If so, your church choir needs you!

We are very fortunate in this benefice. While a lot of churches have lost their choirs, we haven't. But it's pretty safe bet that once a church loses its music, it won't get it back again. So in order to ensure that we keep ours, we can always do with more singers and players.

So, if you can sing in tune, how about joining the benefice choir? You do not need to be able to read music (but, of course, it helps if you can!!). The commitment is not all that great. We always sing on the first Sunday of each month in one of the seven churches in rotation. When there is a fifth Sunday, we sing then – again on a rotation basis around each church. There is also the odd 'extra' on special occasions. We practice in Parham on Thursdays – 6.30 to 7.30 except on the Thursday before any Sunday when we are 'on', when the practice then takes place in the relevant church.

If you don't want to sing but can play the piano, would you consider joining the dedicated but small group of accompanists who play for the choir at the practices?

While some of our churches have a 'resident organist', not all of them do and there are times when it is difficult to find anyone who is free to stand in. So if you can play the organ, how about giving that a go?

<u>'A Great Cloud of Witnesses'</u> Mark Cazalet, the artist in residence at the Cathedral has been commissioned to create 153 life size oil paintings of heads, not so much formal portraits, more a collage of colour and shape, all of which are building up to be the great the 'great cloud of Suffolk witnesses'. Mine is number 30, and was painted recently after I responded to the open invitation in the East Anglican. During the 45 minute session in a temporary studio high up in the North transept choir gallery, with all the life and sounds of the Cathedral going on below, you sit with Mark in silent meditation, with an empty third chair left for Christ to join you, only as Mark prays, he is producing a version of you in oils, which when complete, goes down stairs to hang on the walls of the Edmund chapel until All Saints Day.

I was sometimes aware of the smell of oil, or the scratch of a brush, but it was an uncommon luxury for your hardworking priest to have a whole 30 minutes to contemplate in silence and without interruption. One of the sessions of our Lent course sessions offered the chance to practice using silent prayer, and in an attempt to persuade you to try meditation for yourself, I can only say that I found the experience with Mark Cazalet to be profound, spiritual, and very moving. Knowing yourself being observed in prayer

should have been uncomfortable, but wasn't. I found myself, my thoughts and prayers directed to the empty chair, and the feeling of heaven was very close indeed, if that doesn't sound too fanciful, and it was, perhaps the most intimate prayer time I have had in a long while. The time passed in a flash, and I stayed afterwards to enjoy choral Evensong watching the golden light of late afternoon streaming through the west window, and hearing the choir practice at a distance. All in all an experience I would urge you to try, and as an added bonus the food in the Pilgrims Kitchen is so much improved over what used to be offered in the Refectory, they even have leather sofa's if you just want pot of tea or bowl of homemade soup.

There are both morning and afternoon slots so you could easily combine this treat with some shopping in Bury and lunch with a friend, you can book this experience, and there are still slots available for later in the year, by contacting Jayne Whitman in the Cathedral Office on 01284 748722

HISTORY CORNER

Superstitions and cures for complaints.

In the 19th Cent, a Suffolk clergyman collected the following "remedies" for common complaints and had them published in The East Anglian Miscellany.

Warts. Allow a slug or snail to crawl over the wart and then bury the creature in a bed of manure or impale it on a thorn. As the snail dries up, so the wart will disappear. (Many people today agree that mind over matter helps and my parents knew of an old lady who could "charm" warts.)

Rheumatics are relieved by carrying in the pocket of his trousers, 4 moles feet!

Toothache. Carry in your pocket a hazel nut with two kernels or, sleep with your left stocking on!

Whooping cough. To cure this put in a small muslim bag, as many large spiders as the patient has years. Hold the bag in the mouth for a few moments then hang it on the head of the bed for the remainder of the night.

I am sure that many of you have heard of cures passed down through families which are sworn to work. My Mum made up a bread poultice, applied hot, to "draw" a boil. My wife remembers her bronchial step father being wrapped in a "thermogene" vest which was like cotton wool smelling strongly of menthol. One of the most common was dipping your feet in the contents of the "pot" to cure chilblains, and, before you ask, I have never had a chilblain in my life!

Perhaps the strangest story the good gentleman came across concerned a small boy who stabbed himself with a pitchfork. The wound was slight and had been dressed. At tea time, a servant brought a message from the coachman saying "Please tell Master Willie that the place will heal up soon because I have greased the pitchfork and hung it up so that keep bright till the wound mend.".

Another little lad broke his thigh but couldn't understand why as he had never killed a robin.

When many people denigrate our wonderful National Health Service and talk about "The good old days" we should realise how far medicine has come. Thank goodness most "goesunders" have disappeared from our homes, or if not, probably hold flowers!
