Dear Friends

Am I the only person to feel that this year is moving like greased lightning? It's March already! The Church now enters the season of Lent, all flowers are removed, and the colour of the frontals is purple for a penitential season. This is because Lent is the time when Christians imitate Jesus' experiences in the desert, a time when he was stripped of the most basic things, life's necessities. He had nothing left but to come face to face with God.

Some people give up things for Lent, treating it like a period of abstinence from things that comfort, like chocolate and even alcohol which is good for our pockets and make us appreciate them all the more when we have them again. It's a humbling experience not to take things for granted and to realise how very fortunate we are. We have so much that we can give up things for 40 days, remembering elsewhere in the world people are going hungry. In Kagera, a Diocese in Tanzania (which St Eds & Ips have been helping support for many, many years) the crops people grow on small plots of land to support and feed their families have failed, due to lack of rain, and near drought conditions exist.

If you were thinking you might give up something for Lent, might I suggest you join me this year in 'doing' something instead of 'not doing' something? I am not going to buy any wine during Lent, although the more observant reader will notice I haven't said I won't drink any!! But it is my intention to try for a 'dry' —wine free Lent this year, and donate the amount of money I would have spent on buying wine, to the Kagera Appeal. You can read more about this appeal and how you join in by following this link kagera is such a poor Diocese that we seem wealthy by comparison, so any donation you might make will be of immense help to them.

We will be taking a second collection at our United Service in Parham on March 5th so please look out for the special baskets and perhaps give a donation as a mark of support for our brothers and sisters in Africa. Lent is about sacrifice, and maybe a financial sacrifice to Tanzania is something you might like to consider this year but whatever it is we do for Lent it is all about preparing ourselves mentally and spiritually for the joys and bounty of Easter.
