It has probably gone out by now to be used for immediate food aid in the region worst affected by drought, and also to buy new seed varieties, build small businesses and improve farming methods. A little goes a long way in Africa. The Kagera link coordinators say Thank You, and ask us to shout the news to everyone. I too, say thank you, thank you for getting behind this idea in such an enthusiastic way.

Photography competition to capture the sounds of Suffolk

Take a moment to imagine if you couldn't hear the birds singing, your friends talking in the pub, or your favourite song playing on the radio. This is reality for many people who experience hearing loss and a major new photographic competition is being launched by one of Suffolk's best-known businesses to raise awareness about the importance of hearing.

Titled 'Sounds of Suffolk' the competition is being launched as part of Deaf Awareness Week, a national initiative also aimed at highlighting hearing impairment.

Award-winning hearing care specialist, The Hearing Care Centre, based locally at Framlingham GP Surgery, is inviting amateur and professional photographers alike from across the county to enter the competition with pictures which demonstrate the incredible sounds that can be found in and around our beautiful county and may not otherwise be heard by those with hearing loss.

"It could be the sea crashing against the shore at Southwold, birds singing at Minsmere, the bells chiming at Bury St Edmunds Cathedral or screaming thrill seekers on a ride at Pleasurewood Hills" says Karen Finch, Managing Director of The Hearing Care Centre. "In fact any picture which depicts the sounds of the county in a powerful way," she says.

"People with good hearing often don't realise the impact even mild hearing loss has on the enjoyment of ordinary things around us — we want our competition and the campaign to draw attention to some of the sounds that hard-of-hearing people cannot hear."

Karen explained: "It can take years for some people to decide to do something about their hearing loss - it's estimated that there over 119,000 people in Suffolk who experience hearing loss, yet so many have yet to do anything about it. We want to get the message across that they really are missing out on life and CAN do something about it."

The Hearing Care Centre, which has 24 centres across Suffolk and Norfolk, is putting up a top prize of £250 for the best picture, followed by £100 for second place and an annual subscription to Suffolk Magazine for third place.

Hearing Loss Statistics*

- There are over 800,000 people in the UK who are severely or profoundly deaf
- Over half (55%) of people over 60 have a hearing loss and 90% of patients over 81
- 4 million people have hearing loss of 35 dB or more in the better ear but don't wear hearing aids despite the huge benefits this would give them (link 4million report)
- Action on Hearing Loss research shows that there are now 10 million people in the UK with hearing loss of at least 25 decibel (dB) in the better ear – 1 in 6 of the population.
- People leave on average a 10-15 year delay from the onset of hearing loss to addressing their condition
- Evidence suggests that GPs fail to refer up to 45% of people reporting hearing loss, for an intervention, such as a referral for a hearing test or a hearing aid
 - The most common type of hearing loss in the UK is among people who are gradually losing their hearing as part of the ageing process.

On behalf of St Elizabeth Hospice, I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for all your hard work and dedication as a volunteer. Without your support we could not provide the vital services and care to patients, families and friends.


Last year we conducted a paper based volunteer survey, we found the results to be really informative and helpful, so we would like to conduct another survey this year. Last year 30% of volunteers responded to this initial paper based survey. This year we are going online and I hope this will encourage even more of you to participate.

Those who responded told us:

- Three quarters of you volunteer only for the hospice
- One fifth of you have a personal connection with the hospice
- The vast majority felt valued and supported
- Four out of five respondents expected to continue volunteering with us for at least another year

This year we will be working with Hospice UK and Birdsong Charity Consulting who offer hospices the opportunity to participate in a hospice staff and volunteer survey. The hospice staff survey 2017 has been set up to provide hospices with a cost effective means of seeking staff and volunteer opinions about their jobs and their workplace. It enables benchmarking against the survey data of other hospices and against a wider benchmark of other charities. In 2016 46 hospices took part, involving around 7,500 staff and volunteers.

History Corner

The Strange Happenings at Benacre Hall

In the late 18th century, Francis Robert Sherlock Lambert Gooch, aged 21, met and married his wife, soon to become Lady Anne Gooch. The title of Baronet and the sum of £25,000 had passed to Francis on the premature death of his elder brother who had inherited it on the death of their father. He and his wife had no surviving offspring and, according to custom, his wife, became the dowager, and Francis was expected to maintain her lifestyle while she lived. Sir Francis had a younger brother who would inherit should he have no children himself. A child was born to the couple which unfortunately died at the age of seven months.

After five years without getting pregnant again, Lady Anne, seemingly, had worked out where she stood in the pecking order and realised that she could finish up with nothing at all if anything untoward happened to her husband. In August 1877 Lady Anne announced that she was pregnant but for some reason Sir Francis was suspicious, (I imagine the "bloom" had gone off the marriage) and doubted her word. On a trip to Brighton he had her examined by a doctor. The doctor never spoke to Sir Francis but he was told by Lady Anne, that the doctor's opinion was that she was with child. Still dissatisfied Sir Francis arranged for another investigation by the family doctor whose opinion was that she was not "in the family way" as the newspapers put it!

This did not deter Lady Anne, who, with the aid of suitable padding, carried on with the charade. She tried to get the help of her companion, a Miss Garrod, to back up her story, offering her £100 per year. The house keeper proved to be an honorable woman and refused, acting instead as informant for the family. Although her husband knew of her plot she went to an orphanage in Gt Coram St in London who put her on to a Mrs Main, who had just been delivered of a healthy boy. She tried to involve a Dr Laking in a mock birth, but to no avail. At the later trial he gave evidence that the child was at least 14 days old. She was arrested, brought to trial and acquitted, the jury seemingly convinced that no woman of her position would attempt such a deception unless mentally ill.

that no woman of her position would attempt such a deception unless mentally il All her scheming was for nothing, and, had it succeeded, she would not have benefitted as she died the next year.

Her most insensitive obituary in the "Daily News" simply said; "Lady Gooch who tried to palm off a ficticious child on her husband is dead.
