HISTORY CORRER

Great Suffolk Oaks

In Tudor times, Suffolk was known as the "Oaken heartland of England" and John Evelyn speaks of the special grandeur of these magnificent trees. The great Framlingham oak, used in the building of The Royal Sovereign was four feet nine inches square, and yielded four square

beams, each of which was 44 feet long. Another majestic oak, felled at Dennington in 1764, had a circumference of seventeen feet, taken four feet from the ground, and had a trunk length to the boll of sixty feet, yielding sixteen tons of sound timber. Cretingham had a huge old oak with a split hollow trunk. It's claim to fame was that a young man had driven a pony and trap through it. Many of these hollow trunk giants were felled as being dangerous, but modern thinking is that they do not pose a risk and often have amazing strength. A wonderful example of an ancient tree, known to be 1000 years old can be seen in Haughley Park. Its' trunk is completely split, and like some of us as we get older, has had to have some support in the form of brick piers, to hold its branches up. The great Christchurch park in Ipswich, although it had its oak tree numbers decimated by the 1987 hurricane, still has some wonderful examples. As a child, my imagination ran wild about these giants as they resembled those in fairy stories. In the country, you can still see isolated, ancient trees, in what was old park or meadow land, although many of these have been pollarded.

Clifford Arbon, the Monewden wheelwright, told me that his Grandfather, who owned the business, would go around a farm, with the farmer and chose the tops of trees he needed to purchase. Ash was used to make the fellies, oak for spokes and wych elm for the hubs. The latter had a twisted grain which would not split. These old tradesmen had so much knowledge about their trade, which is now disappearing because it is no longer necessary. He told me that when you drill the hole in a wheel to take the hub, "You mustn't drill it dead centre, that will bind up. You have to make the hole an eighth of an inch of centre" The reason for this was all to do with the angle the wheels were to the

These wonderful tradesmen, like the timber they worked, have mostly gone, but they leave behind a wonderful heritage in the form of their memories and examples of their work.

From The Reverend Graham Hedger

As I write this, the combine harvesters are out in force, the lanes are filled with tractors and trailers hauling off their valuable cargo. It depends who you talk to and which field they are in as to how a farmer will speak about the harvest. For some the winter crops have been very good, but the spring crops not so good, and for those who have livestock it has been a challenging summer. Throughout the benefice we will celebrate harvest festival from mid- September through to mid-October, which recognises that harvest is a prolonged affair and so as a benefice we will celebrate over many Sundays.

This year has made us aware of the dependence we have on factors that are outside our control. Technology and experience are important in todays agriculture but at the end of the day we are reliant on factors outside our control, namely the weather. Gathering for harvest festivals this year may be a greater cause of celebration than usual. For people in our sister diocese of Kagera in Tanzania, it has been not just one year but several years of poor rainfall and therefore poor harvests. For that reason, last year Bishop Martin launched an appeal in Lent for funds to support our Tanzanian sisters and brothers. The appeal raised over £50,000 and the money has been routed through TEAR Fund (a major church- based relief organisation) and is being used in a number of projects in partnership with the diocese. I've been mindful of environmental issues for much of my life, but it wasn't until around the year 2000 that I attended my first detailed briefing about climate change. It seemed a doomsday scenario. If anything has changed, it is that the predictions get worse. For many years churches around the world have used the 'Marks of Mission' to describe their task. The fifth Mark is 'to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew life on earth.' For people of all faiths and none, this is an issue that won't go away and challenges us about how our lifestyle impacts on the world around us and future generations. Each one of us can make a difference and harvest is an opportunity to take stock and rededicate ourselves to the task.


