HISTORY CORRER

Early Emigration to Australia- PART 2 by Peter Driver

The Head family sailed on 6th August 1839 and soon realised the realities of a long ocean journey in a sailing ship. Head volunteered to be cook at the start of the voyage but owing to the real fear of fire on a tar caulked, wooden vessel, there was only one range supervised by the ship's cook. Head was more of a "monitor". His wife prepared their meal and he took it and a neighbour's food to be cooked. Head's diary entries help us to imagine life on board.

10th August "All very ill (sea sickness) gave up being cook!" They experienced all kinds of weather. During storms they were battened down, which must have been terrifying.

Wed 22nd August -sailing in the Great Western Ocean (the Atlantic) " Ann Edge died at half past nine in the evening aged one year."

Passengers entertained themselves, "My wife and I went up to the forecastle and heard some very pretty songs."

8th September "The crew caught a large shark which had six little ones within it. I tasted a piece after it was cooked, and it was very good."

"The captain caught a fine albatross, the size of a goose and it tasted just as good". (So much for the myth of Coleridge's "Ancient Mariner" where, killing such a bird meant bad luck!)

Excitement was caused when another ship was sighted, and both launched cutters to exchange mail and items. Once they caught up with the vessel "Caroline". Head wrote," I was pleased to hear that William Taylor and Bill Freeman from Hollesley were on board. I wrote a few lines to them." Ashore these early settlers sought others from their home area to be near. By this time Head had scurvy with pains in his legs and gums, caused by the lack of vitamin C *. Nearly 20 weeks into the voyage they were approaching Adelaide. The women and children were taken ashore by boat as there was no quay and George followed with their goods the next day. A kindly sailor carried him through the surf to save his poor, sore covered legs from getting wet. A tough voyage on which fifteen children and five adults died and five children were born. Head wrote, "I never wish a person to go on board a ship for so long a time as it weakens one very much." The irony is that this trip on an aircraft today, takes just about 24 hours!

*It still wasn't common knowledge that vitamin C was so important. Fresh fruit and juice were later added to the diet and some people think that the term "Limey" comes from emigrants.



4th October

I think it fair to say that autumn has certainly arrived – although we have been enjoying mainly mild and sunny days, the evening temperatures are noticeably cooler and the shorter days herald the arrival of longer, darker nights.

But it's easy to see why the arrival of autumn and winter, for some, can mean more prolonged periods of loneliness and isolation. One of the things that makes me particularly proud to represent this area of the country is that we are so lucky here in Suffolk to have such a strong sense of community spirit and inclusion. I especially enjoy meeting so many dedicated volunteers and visitors at the regular coffee mornings and social events that take place throughout Central Suffolk and North Ipswich. Community events such as these provide a vital lifeline for those living in a rural county like Suffolk, bringing together like minded friends and ensuring that local communities stay connected and in touch with one another.

Loneliness and isolation can often be associated with poor mental health; Wednesday 10^{th} October was World Mental Health Day and I was encouraged to learn about *Time to Change's* simple but effective "Ask Twice" initiative. The initiative is aiming to change the way we all think and act about mental health problems and although attitudes and behaviour are slowly changing towards mental ill health, there is much more to be done to break down the stigma so often attached. None of us think twice about seeking medical advice or help for a physical illness or injury, but with mental ill health, many people are still too proud to seek help, or don't consider mental health to be relevant to them.

When most of us ask a friend, colleague or loved one "How are you?", the usual and expected response is "Fine, thanks." But the reality is that we can all be guilty of saying we're fine when we're not. With one in four people experiencing a mental health problem this year alone, it seems pretty clear that many of us are saying we're fine when we're not. That's why the "Ask Twice" campaign is encouraging us to simply ask our friends, colleagues and loved ones twice if they are ok. Leading such busy lives, time is often at a premium, but the simple act of asking twice shows that we really are willing to listen.

Whilst it's clear to see that much has been achieved so far in raising awareness of mental ill health and the stigma that surrounds it, there is also much more to be done and I will continue to do all that I can to fight for more money for better mental health services here in Suffolk.

From The Reverend Graham Hedger

On the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month in 1918 the guns fell silent. Sadly, even in those final hours as the hour approached, men lost their lives, either through ignorance, stupidity or pride seeking to seize an extra few yards of land. It was supposed to be the war to end all wars, yet, within 21 years the world would be gripped by another world war. Perhaps some lessons were learned as the punishment of Versailles gave way to rebuilding of nations and co-operation post the second world war.

Look at most, if not all war memorials and you will see that lives lost in the WW1 were far greater than the second world war. In villages and towns young men raced to answer the call to arms little knowing what would await them. No 24/7 news and social media in those days. In some families a whole generation would be wiped out. Others returned broken men. I was still burying casualties of WW1 in the 1980s, men whose bodies and minds had been damaged by the conflict.

At Remembrance services we utter the words, 'we will remember them.' In recent years this has taken on new meaning as people have tried to find out more about the names of the fallen. It has become important that we know something of their family and their service. At Hacheston we have remembered each fallen soldier from the village at the mid-week communion service closest to the day they fell. Over the Remembrance weekend many villages, not just in this benefice are holding special events to commemorate the ending of the WW1. I hope that many will visit these exhibitions and take time to ponder the events of 100 years ago.

It is important to remember the lessons of history, or we are doomed to repeat the mistakes again and again. So, I hope that lots of people will gather at the Remembrance services throughout the benefice, to remember and to commit themselves to the work of peace. Perhaps more than at any time in recent history we need men and women who will stand for freedom, tolerance, justice and peace. True everlasting peace will not come until Christ comes again but we pray 'your kingdom come on earth as in heaven' and then are commanded to seek to make it so.

24th January: Brendan Baker: **Money** (What it is and is not).


