From the Reverend Graham

As a football fan I watched the exploits of England in the recent euros. I have to confess that these days I get more excited about club football than the national team. However, like many, I watched the final. So near and yet so far.

What came afterwards exposed the reality that at the heart of our nation there is still a minority of people who cannot accept that we are all equal. The outpouring of racist abuse on some of the England players was abhorrent. Thankfully many more rallied round to show that they valued and respected the black players. In the bible, we are told that in Christ there is no Jew or non-Jew, no slave, or free, rather all are equal.

Sadly, the church has a long way to go. Over the past year I have read two books about racism in the church. The first was called 'Ghostship' and looked at specific instances of racism through the eyes of an Anglican clergyman. More recently, I was challenged as I read 'God is not a white man' by Chine MacDonald, who, using her experiences as a person of Nigerian birth came to this country as a child of a doctor and a teacher and eventually went to Cambridge and has worked for several development agencies.

Both books challenge the church to do more to expose the unseen, unspoken racism within our words and attitudes. In many ways the church is no more than a microcosm of society, but we are called to be different and to model a new way. The next few years are going to be very challenging as the Church of England seeks to make changes and maybe one day we look back on the events of 2020 and 2021 as really making a change to how everyone is viewed both within the church and society. Enjoy the summer sun.

Covid safe Church Services

From July 19th government regulations have become guidance. The way we organise our services in church is based upon national guidance. Our aim is to make them as safe as possible with everyone taking responsibility for themselves and showing compassion and courtesy to others. As with all things the Covid process will be kept under review.

We are adopting a uniform approach across the benefice.

- 1. Regular risk assessments are carried out in each church.
- 2. Where churches have side doors and windows these will be open for ventilation.
- 3. We recognise that some people will feel more vulnerable now than previously and may want to sit on their own or wear a mask at all times. In view of this we invite all people to wear a face covering and to continue to socially distance. For most Sunday services this does not present a problem!
- 4. We ask people to use hand sanitiser as they come in and go out of church.
- 5. At Holy Communion, face coverings to be worn when moving around the church.
- 6. The priest will wear a mask when administering Communion.
- 7. Communion will continue in one kind (bread, no wine).
- 8. We recommence congregational singing in church.

The government has lifted restrictions on numbers attending weddings, funerals and baptisms. In discussion with the families, we will decide whether to limit numbers. If numbers are not limited, then social distancing may not be possible. We ask all people to wear face coverings.
